Talking Points for Conversations Asking for Title IV, Part A Funding for Your Music Program

Key points to know when asking for funding:

- 1. Some administrators might not have any idea what federal Title IV, Part A funds are. You might be helping them to understand it.
- 2. The best way to make a case for receiving these federal funds is a specific reasonable ask. (I would like to purchase Orff instruments for my elementary general music class because...; Adding a trip to the symphony for our class would benefit our students...)
- 3. Keep asks student centered and about **ACCESS** for all students.
- 4. If you can find ways to reference the PA ESSA plan, that helps your case. The PA ESSA plan requires schools to track chronic absenteeism and college/career readiness. Referencing either of those two points helps an administrator make their case.
- 5. Here is a list of some suggested uses of Title IV funds for music ed:

- 7. Mentioning that you've worked with the entire music department is always important.
- 8. Being a schoolwide team player is important. Explain the value of using these funds for your program and how they will help all areas of the school.
